Receiving the confirmation letter for my approval as travelling fellow was an extraordinary feeling. My journey started with an incredible week spent at the St. Mark's Hospital. When I arrived at the hospital I was accepted under the team of Mr. Janindra Warusavitarne. The week that I spent in the hospital was extremely useful for me. I had the possibility to observe a lot of cases, related to IBD, coloproctology and colorectal cancers. During the week I saw a lot of laparoscopic cases as well as VAAFT surgery. For a young surgeon, the feeling to be in a hospital like this, is always hard to be summarised in a couple of sentences. Mr. Warusavitarne was a really friendly, freehearted and amazing person, who did whatever it needed to turn my stay at St. Mark's Hospital into a unique experience. I am really grateful to him for what he did and I am sure that I can call him a good friend of mine.



For my next stop I choose Basingstoke and North Hampshire Hospital. Here I spent 4 days under the team of Mr. Brendan Moran and Mr. Tom Cecil. In my opinion visiting the hospital, where 'the holy plane' was found was obligatory, but not only for the rectal cancers, but also because Basingstoke is one of the leading centers for treating pseudomyxoma peritonei. Unfortunately this disease is currently not well treatable in my country. I was really impressed by the results, achieved by Mr. Moran's team. I had the possibility to see 5 operations for cytoreductive surgery and HIPEC – 3 for pseudomyxoma and 2 for advanced colon cancer. During my stay at Basingstoke I had the chance to observe the pseudomyxoma MDT as well. I am really thankful to all the team and especially to Mr. Brendan Moran for their hospitality and for accepting me under their care.




