Areas of clinical priority and unmet research needs will also be highlighted through the IMPACT initiative.

Proposed Themes for Discussion

Where, when and how services should be configured and delivered:

- Decision-making in advanced malignancy
- Raising awareness about advances in care of advanced disease
- Best practice in referral
- Where and how should care be delivered
- Interaction of specialist services with local hospitals
- Regional and national provision of services
- Should metastatic disease and advanced pelvic disease be managed in separate MDTs?
- What should an advanced cancer clinic/MDT look like?

Impact of disease and treatment in advanced colorectal cancer:

- How to best address issues of survivorship and quality of life?
- Burden of travel for specialist care
- Balance of local support and advice vs distant expertise
- Impact of treatment on family and carers
- Specific quality of life issues arising from managing advanced pelvic disease
- Involvement of palliative care services – when and how?
- Caring for the dying patient

Managing metastatic disease:

- Managing the primary cancer in unresectable metastatic disease
- Managing oligometastases
- Timing of liver metastases & primary resection – synchronous or serial, and what order?
- Integration of decision-making among colorectal, hepatobiliary & thoracic MDTs
- Should all aspects of surgical care be delivered at the same site?
- Non-resectional options for managing lung and liver metastases
- Managing peritoneal metastases – role of cytoreductive surgery & HIPEC

Managing locally advanced and recurrent disease:

- Novel approaches in managing advanced colonic cancer
- Optimization of treatment pathways in locally advanced primary pelvic cancer
- Advanced colorectal malignancy MDT
- Role of the complex cancer clinic
- Achieving clear resection margins through combined radiotherapy, radiology & surgery
- Surgery for recurrent rectal cancer
